OLIVER MADISON GRAVES JR.

Oliver was born November 11, 1936 in Cleveland, Ohio. He was the oldest of five born to Dorothy and Oliver Sr. He was an inquisitive and energetic child. He loved mathematics and reading. Trips to the library on his bicycle were a normal part of his life.

He left home at seventeen years old to join the Army. He didn't even know how to drive. During basic training the first vehicle he ever drove was a big truck. He accomplished that and was a skilled driver until he died.

Oliver's "tour of duty" (deployment) included Korea, Viet Nam twice, Germany twice, Italy and various places in the States. He received a Bronze Star Medal June 2, 1970 while serving in Viet Nam. He also received many awards and certificates for both duty performance and athletic competitions.



While stationed in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania area he met a young lady named Margaret Walker. They were married October 9, 1960. They have two sons, Oliver 3rd and Michael. One of his greatest joys was when he and his sons were together. He retired from the Army in 1977 having twenty-three and a half years of service.

After the Army, Oliver began working for United Parcel Service. He started as a driver, quickly became a supervisor then on to center manager. After fourteen years there he took early retirement to become caregiver for his mother who had been diagnosed with bone cancer.



Oliver was skilled in many things. He had a drive and a determination that was a little more than ordinary. He loved the competition of sports and life. All or nothing; but he did not like cheating. He did not like cheaters.



Oliver also had a bowling "career". He participated in many tournaments for singles, doubles and team events. He received many awards, trophies and patches. His ability earned him four rings and many certificates for perfect games sanctioned by ABC. He would get his awards, stuff them some place and go on to the next thing.

Another area of his life that surprised many was his love of "top 40" music and dancing every Friday night. He'd take off his "bibbes" and put on a fancy shirt and enjoy.




