Alfred Phelps
3 April 1792 – 21 April 1861

Moving to Geauga County from Cayuga County, N.Y., with his sister and brother-in-law at the young age of 11, Alfred Phelps and his family became the first settlers of Parkman Township. Their father, Seth Phelps, did not move with his family in Parkman until 1819.

In the War of 1812, Alfred was wounded at the Battle of Queenstown and taken prisoner, but was released on parole.

Alfred married Anne Towsly of Aurora, N.Y., in July 1820. They had six children: Eliza (died at age 12), Seth Sedyard, Alfred Jr., Mary, Edwin E. and Lucius T. (died in infancy).

Alfred was very involved in the early government of Geauga County. He served as County Prosecutor from 1819 to 1828. For a brief time in 1832, he served as County Recorder. From 1835 to 1840, Alfred was Treasurer of the Geauga County Fair, and in 1845 he was President. During that time (1843–1844 and 1845–1846), he also served as Representative to the Ohio General Assembly. From 1852 to 1858, he was Geauga County Probate Judge. Phelps was also a County School Examiner. Along with his many government positions, Alfred established the first newspaper press in Chardon.

Parkman Trustees Updates

From: Alan Wilson – Parkman Township Trustee

Nash Road – The work on Nash Road west of Tavern Road is progressing. The cement stabilization work has been completed. The goal is to have the paving work done before the end of the month. The majority of the funding for this project was provided by the State of Ohio Issue Two Fund.

Sewer Project – Many of the vacuum pits for the collection system have been installed in the yards of the homeowners that are in the sewer district. A vacuum pit is located between two homes as they will each serve two homes. The company that is installing the collection system hopes to have the installation completed before the end of the year. Construction of the sewer plant is also well under way. The plant will be finished before the end of next year. All tie-ins should be completed by the property owners by the end of next year. The Geauga County Water Resources Department will inform each property owner of the connection dates and fees as we grow closer to the completion of the project.

Community House – All who use the community house are pleased with the new room and additional space provided. The Parkman Chamber of Commerce has donated a new commercial freezer and a new commercial refrigerator for use at the community house to replace the tired old residential refrigerator that we have used for many years. They also donated a pie rack. Many thanks to the Parkman Chamber of Commerce for the donation. These items are sure to serve the community well. The trustees are also adding some additional wall protection as needed in a few locations in the new kitchen as well as some portable stainless steel shelving units.

Cemetery - Two wooden benches and a wooden trash receptacle have been added in the north rear corner of the cemetery and a sign has been placed at the gazebo park. These items have been donated by Josh Hall, Jeremy Hall, and Jeff Hall who were working on Eagle Scout projects. Many thanks to Jeff, Josh, and Jeremy Hall for their service to the community.

Road Levy - The residents of Parkman Township will be asked to make many important decisions when they vote this fall. One of these decisions will have a direct effect on the residents of Parkman Township and anyone who drives on the township roads. The township roads are used by everyone, not just the people who live along those roads. The cost for road material has gone up over the years. The cost to maintain and fuel the road department vehicles and equipment has also increased. The cost for dust control has increased over the last few years because the companies that provided the brine for dust control (at no cost) have not had the brine available to apply to the roads as needed. Two previous road levies were not renewed or replaced so the income to the township from road levies has decreased. The current township road and bridge budget does not provide the funding needed to properly maintain the roads at the standard that the people who drive on the roads have come to expect. If the levy passes, the annual yield in 2007 would be \$95,729. This will help to fund the increased expenses and provide funding for better dust control. These funds are greatly needed to enable the township road department to maintain the roads as expected by the people who drive on them and without these funds, cuts may have to be made. The property tax estimated net increase per year would be about \$45.94 for the owner of a single family owner occupied home with a market value of \$100,000.



Parkman EMS Report From: Joan Dillon—Medical Officer

It's transition time: the hot days of summer are behind us and the cool days of winter approach. Gone are the bee stings, flu season is here, and hypothermia is waiting in the wings. Sound interesting? I can guarantee there's seldom a dull moment. Would any of our residents like to join us in serving their friends and neighbors in one of the finest ways possible? The department pays for your fire and EMT basic training courses. The Trustees have recently passed the following guidelines for Paramedic training:

1. The member applying for Paramedic training must be recommended by the Fire Chief or the Medical Officer.
2. The candidate must have been a member of the Parkman Fire Department for at least one year and an EMT for a minimum of one year.
3. The candidate must be a Parkman Township resident.
4. The Township will pay for classes and materials up to \$4,000 per person for a state-approved Paramedic educational program. This amount may be adjusted by the Township Trustees on recommendation of the Fire Chief, if necessary.
5. The candidate will be asked to sign a promissory note to repay the Township for these training classes if he/she does not remain on the Parkman Township Fire Department as an active participant for a minimum period of two years after receiving his/her Ohio State Certification Paramedic card.
6. If the candidate does not pass the National Registry tests or does not meet the requirements of obtain his/her Ohio State Certification Paramedic card, he/she must pay for any additional classes and testing on his/her own. The candidate must continue to actively pursue obtaining his/her Ohio State Certification Paramedic card.
7. If the candidate does not pass the National Registry tests or does not meet the requirements to obtain his/her Ohio State Certification Paramedic card within two years after first sitting for the National Registry examinations, he/she will be required to repay the Township for those monies advanced for the initial Paramedic training classes.

As I tell all our EMT students, if you want it bad enough, you can do it. Any questions? Talk to any Fire Department member or come to the station on Wednesday evenings at 7:30pm and meet the troops. 1st Wednesday is monthly meeting, 3rd Wednesday is EMS training, 2nd and 4th Wednesdays are Fire training and/or maintenance. Bring your enthusiasm and dedication. We'll supply the rest. Anyone interested in becoming trained in emergency medicine and responding with the Fire Department, contact Chuck or Joan at 548-7541.

Parkman Fire Report Chief Wayne Komandt

Tonight was the night I was going to write my article for the Parkman Newsletter. First I had a county fire fighter association meeting to go to. My plan was to do the article on my return. But life of a volunteer is never predictable. On the way home from the meeting there was a garage fire in Troy. As a Parkman Fire Department responds automatically with Troy on structures fires, we were paged and I responded to the fire station. We responded with a Pumper and a Tanker truck. My job at the fire was to take charge of the water supply, which means I am responsible for insuring there is enough water to fight the fire. We put down a folding water tank and filled it with 2000 gallons of water. The next truck in had 3000 gallons of water. This also was put into the tank. These two trucks went to refill their tanks. Another truck was backed to the tank in case it was needed. Luckily it wasn't. In any case, the fire was put out, without loosing the garage. No injuries occurred and everyone returned home safely tonight. Remember that your volunteer Firefighters do their job whenever needed. Not for Pay, Fame, or Glory, but because they have a desire to help their neighbors!

Did you ever wonder what the Parkman Road Department does? Well here is a short but hopefully informative, summary. The township has 55.44 lane miles of roads:

Maintains

14.14 lane miles of paved

41.3 lane miles of gravel

55.44 lane miles of ditches

Plows and winter treat 55.44 lanes miles

Mows 47 miles of roadsides twice a year

110 crossover pipes

Installs and replaces:

driveway pipes

Street and traffic control signs

Approximate use of material: 2600 tons of limestone

3200 tons of steel slag

Cemetery and Parks: mows 22 acres of grass

Weed whacks around 1725 headstones

And other obstacles every two weeks

We also maintain and clean the equipment we use, plant the flowers around town and put up and take down flags for the holidays and too many other smaller things to mention. I hope this helps you to understand what we do and how busy we are through out the year. We take pride in our work and do the best job we can with the resources we have.

Just a reminder its the homeowners responsibility to keep there driveway pipes clear of leaves and debris. Leaves can cause water buildup quickly, so help maintain flooding troubles by simply cleaning debris from that area. Snow season is near, remember that plowing a driveway starts at the street and then proceeds into the yard. Thank you all for performing these simple routines and saving many headaches for everyone in the community.

Efforts Of H. W. Cromwell Rewarded; Plane Carries 12
