Harold Lewis Blackford



Born on the kitchen table September 10, 1924 to Joseph and Evelyn Blackford at the farm located on the Parkman Nelson Road.

He was the oldest of four children. Roy, Lucille, and Janet were his siblings.

After graduating from Parkman High School in 1943, he worked as a tractor mechanic until entering the service in Cleveland, Ohio February 13, 1945.

On August 3, 1945, he departed the United States for the Philippines serving as an auto mechanic attached to the M.P. unit. He received the Asiatic Pacific Theater Ribbon, Victory Medal, and Good Conduct Medal. He returned from the war on October 12, 1946. He was honorably discharged from the military on December 1, 1946. Harold would never talk about his war experience with his family. The only exception was that after the war he refused to eat chicken or turkey ever again in his life.

He celebrated New Year's Day in 1949 with his new bride Josephine Brown. They were married for 62 years. Jo remembers first watching him from the upper hillside near the farm. As a nine year old, Harold was sitting on the tractor pretending, with loud noises and animated movements, to be driving the tractor. Back then, the farm was used to grow gladiolus for funeral homes in Cleveland.

Harold worked at Geauga Industries in Middlefield until he was severely burned in an industrial accident.

His later years were spent raising sheep and growing hay at the Parkman farm.

He had three children Brenda, David and Linda. He loved good coffee, doughnuts, trains and airplanes. He had beautiful blue eyes. He was a gentle man.

He was 86 years old when he left his duties here on Friday, January 28, 2011.

The Blackford family thanks all the people in the military for their honest and faithful service to this country.





This year marks the 150th Anniversary of the start of the American Civil War. Forty-three men from Parkman served in this war. Some are buried at the Lower Cemetery and others at Overlook Cemetery.
