Parkman Trustees Updates

From: Alan Wilson – Parkman Township Trustee

<u>Parkman Sewer Project</u> – The sewer plant is scheduled to be complete in July and will be ready for residents in the sewer district to tie in shortly thereafter. The Geauga County Department of Water Management anticipates that the project will be completed by the end of the year. Residents in the sewer district please watch for the coming update meeting scheduled to provide additional details to those who will tie into the sewer and answer questions that they may have.

Township Road Update - One of the largest factors that needs to be taken into consideration when maintaining the township roads is the limited funds available to accomplish what is needed and expected by the people who drive on the roads. The road department will continue to grade the road to take care of as many holes as possible but the amount of gravel available to use on the roads will be limited. Limited funding and increased gravel and fuel costs will result in an overall reduction of the amount of gravel that can be purchased for use on the roads. Every effort is made to request brine water for dust control, but the companies that supply that to the township have not been able to keep up with the township road needs. Again, because of the lack of funding additional dust control measures can not be considered at this time. The road department will make the most of what they have to work with.

Route 422 Construction – Reconstruction planned by ODOT on SR 422 will begin in May. There will be one lane of traffic eastbound. Hobart Road will be a detour route for local residents in the construction zone who need to travel west. The trustees will be working with ODOT to pave Hobart Road because of the greater use of this road. The general detour route will be SR 422 to SR 305 to SR 44. The project is expected to take 18 to 24 months to complete. Additional information will be provided as it is becomes available.

The Township Board of Trustees welcomes residents to contact us with suggestions or concerns about the township. Township residents are welcome to attend all township meetings. We greatly value your input.

Township History and Fact Finding - Parkman Cheesehouse

Hello Parkman Paragraphs,

I'm searching for information on Geauga County cheese factories. I found your towns on the www.ParkmanOhio.com . Does anyone know when the Parkman cheese factory stopped processing dairy products? Any information would be greatly appreciated.

Hi Don.

Our Parkman Cheese Factory was built in 1863, by a New York company called Stokes and Budlong. It is said that they went into production right away and were very successful. Milk was collected by horse then. Nearly every farm in the community contributed to the supply of milk, thus making the runs very long. In the late 1860's, the company changed owners to OC Smith. This became known as the O C Smith Manufacturing Company. There was a patent in 1881 where rotary cheese vats were invented. In one year, 260,000 pounds of cheese was made netting a profit of \$27,000.

In the late 1880's, after the death of Smith, the company changed hands again several times and thus managed unsuccessfully. At the turn of the century, there was a craze for roller-skating and a new floor was put upstairs to support the new trend. Some time around there (1900 ish) the cheese production ceased and the building was closed. I will research this more for you to get a closer to exact date.

In 1924, the cheese factory was redesigned as the new Parkman Community House. A local group called the Mothers Club donated money to help fix it up. The were active in raising money with fund raisers and bake sales to help organize its construction. It was remodeled to the current look. It hosts a 150 seating capacity community hall for all of our local events. Upstairs (2nd floor) is still an open floor used now as a dancing area. This past year (2006) we remodeled a new kitchen to modernize it to current FDA standards. It is a local treasure and used by the community regularly. Basement hosts the Town Trustee and business meetings. The building has much character to it and is a symbol of the communities heritage.

Hope you find this information useful.

The History of the Western Phoenix (Parkman) Masons #42

Our guest speaker, Dale Komandt, presented the history of the Western Phoenix Masonic Lodge #42 and is importance to our community. Parkman has one of the oldest in Ohio and the first in Geauga County. The #42 Charter was granted to Parkman members in 1818. Members would meet on Thursday eve following the full moon as there were no street lights to travel by. The lodge ceased to exist between 1828 to 1857. In 1866, the third floor of the Blackmann and Jones Building was erected for the lodge meetings. It cost \$1300 to build. Most of the records before 1886 were lost to time and fire, however they are in the hands of the present lodge 1877 to present.

This year the Western Phoenix Masonic #42 will celebrate its 150 anniversary! 1857-2007

The Historical Society "Series of Mugs" has the 1907 Parkman School on it for this year. \$5.00/each or 2 for \$9.00 Next year we will have the mill on the mug.

With the failure of another Road & Bridge levy the Parkman Road Dept. will be reducing the amount of gravel spread on the roads. Also grading and roadside mowing will be reduced. Fuel and gravel prices are higher making it necessary for these extreme measures. Until a Road & Bridge levy is passed we will
