Parkman Trustees Notes

From: Lucinda Sharp Gates

News from your Trustees:

Make sure to mark your calendars for all the gatherings, both social and informational, in Parkman.

The Geauga Park District will be holding an open community meeting at our Community House on September 17th to discuss the opening of Camp Chicagami to the community.

November will see a RENEWAL Roads & Bridges levy of .5 mills (point 5 mills) that will NOT raise your taxes because it is a renewal. It generates about \$24,000 for the road department.

It is hard to remember back to March 7th-10th and the snow/ice storm that was just another snow/ice event in Geauga County. FEMA declared a state of emergency and has made available a refund for that weekend event based on overtime, equipment and material. Pounds of paperwork and gathering information have generated both a check from FEMA as well as an appreciation of the work of our road department and crew that kept us road-ready.

From the Township Association meeting held on the 9th of July we learned that once again septic systems are the topic of conversation in Columbus. Because the State no longer sends monetary support to our local Health District, fees have doubled for both point of sale septic inspections and installation permits. "Normal" septic systems can be installed until July of 2009.

You might have seen some surveyors around the 422/88 intersection in the last few weeks. ODOT is having a study done to determine some of the alternative available to remedy the traffic flow. ODOT will hold an as yet unannounced community meeting to discuss some of those options.

All are welcome at the regularly scheduled Trustee's meetings held at 7:30pm in the office at the back of the Community House on the first and third Tuesday of the month.

The next training was at the Parkman Community House where a car fire was the scene of adventure. Those who participated donned full gear and went in to this potentially dangerous situation. When working with vehicles, possible explosion could occur, so quick response time is always necessary. Special Thanks to Chris Kohler owner of Kohler Auto Wrecking for his continuous support and supplying the vehicle for this training.

Ah, it's summer. When the sun shines and it's not so humid, it's actually semi-enjoyable. You know, there are actually people out there who love to soak up those elevated temperatures? Go figure. Then there are those who have no choice, but do it anyway. Think of the firemen at a house fire in 90 degree weather, dressed in multiple-layered bunkers, heavy boots, head/neck protectors and helmets. Add the SCBA (self-contained breathing apparatus). Then they actually go into a burning building!! Now you know why some of us fight fires and some of us stand by in the shade ready to render aid and comfort to the brave souls (volunteers all) who face the heat head-on.

This time of year we see a lot of heat-related emergencies. The high humidity we are so blessed with (?) in this area slows the evaporation of perspiration. You can absorb more heat than you can radiate (get rid of). You tire more easily. If you continue to push yourself, guess what? "HELLO. We're 911. Congratulations, you win a trip to the ER." Add any other medical history...high blood pressure, heart disease, lung problems etc. and you may win a lights and siren trip to the ER. Heat cramps (water and body salt loss), heat exhaustion (heavy water and body salt loss) and heat stroke (body's temperature-regulating mechanism fails) will all earn you one or two IVs to replace the water and electrolytes you didn't drink voluntarily. Be good to yourself and stay home to enjoy life.

One moment to draw attention to your pets who can't always help themselves. If they spend most of their time outdoors, make sure they have fresh water daily and a shady place to get out of the sun.

Parkman Zoning Inspector

In the second half of 2007, the zoning commission made changes to the zoning resolution that affect the minimum side yards for all buildings and minimum distances between buildings for accessory buildings located in a R-1 Residential Zone. The minimum side yard for all buildings is now 25 feet. It was 20 feet. The minimum distance from an accessory building to any other building is 20 feet. Previously, there was no minimum listed distance from another building. I encourage anyone interested in becoming more familiar with the Zoning Resolution to stop in at the zoning office any Wednesday evening between 7 and 8:30pm to review the resolution in further detail. When was this picture of Parkman Mill taken? - Marvin Mullet

Hi Cory;

I am a Parkman resident, and would like to know an approximate date on a Parkman photo. Maybe you can help me. You used the photo of the Grist Mill in Featured Story of the Fall 2005 Parkman Paragraphs. Since I presently own the home on the far right of the photo, I can place the date as pre 1930's - the time an addition was built to the house. If you can get a closer date or already know it. The info would be helpful and appreciated. Thank You.

Hi Marvin,

I am "guessing" the date of the photo mid 1920's due to the old bridge. This was the old dam (number 2) - before the second flood which took out the dam and original bridge. The first flood was pre 1900 - I think it was around the 1840-1850 timeframe. The next flood was in the early 1900's, I think I heard a date around 1910-1915. The next flood was in the 1940-1950 timeframe and the dam that is present is rebuilt with the current bridge. Today's bridge does not have upper rails on it. The previous bridge does, and the first bridge was hardly anything more than just some wood crossing the river.

Based on this information - and the shape of the Grist Mill - my best guess of the date on the picture is Mid 1920's. I hope this has helped some. Can anyone help narrow the date down???

Respect the Amish Pace in Parkman - from Cory Anderson

Late this spring I decided to take a ride around Parkman on my custom handcycle. Since I live in a wheelchair, this device is similar to a bicycle and is geared to make travel easy. I chose a (thought to be) quiet road, and began my country paced adventure. Since I have been writing about Parkman for the last four years, I felt it was time to actually see it at the pace of an Amish Buggy.

I left my house and traveled down a quiet back road and enjoyed the open scenery of this country atmosphere. My speed was between 10-15 miles per hour, about the speed of a horse and buggy. Everything was good until I entered some curves in the road.

As I went through these curves, some car traffic (from both directions) also entered into these curves at a much higher speed. As one tried to pass me, it cut off the oncoming car. This "could" have got ugly really fast! Well, as I am writing this today, you know I did not end up in a disaster, and a very important lesson was learned.

Knowing that the Amish lifestyle must face this every day, I had to share this experience. The hustle of today's traffic holds little patience for slower road users. This can lead to (and I am sure it has been) a growing problem for our community. So without standing on a soapbox, I hope that you learn through this experience that the Parkman area is "country" and the pace of life should reflect that.

Show some respect on our roads and enter those hard to see area's with more care. Curves and Hills are plentiful in our area, all of which has potential for disaster when slower traffic is present. Vehicles that travel at higher speeds have the responsibility to drive with respect for all other traffic on our roads, whether it is horse and buggy, bicycle, or even foot traffic. Please use extra special caution when the fast pace norm attempts to overtake Parkman's slower traffic. Everyone on the road deserves respect - thank you for your help to keep our community safe!



Military Garden at Parkman Overlook Cemetery

On May 10, Dale Komandt, Sexton of Overlook Cemetery, and his wife, Lynn, were invited to the Mallory-DeHaven-Carlson Funeral Home in Garrettsville, where Overlook Cemetery was presented with five commemorative concrete garden stones depicting the military branches: Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force and Coast Guard. The stones are large, 18" in diameter and 2" thick. They were painted gold and placed around the star near the American Flag and memorial to honor the many service people of all wars that are buried at Overlook Cemetery.
